



What is Illinois Works for the Future?

Illinois Works for the Future is a campaign initiated by the Chicago Jobs Council, the Center for Tax and Budget Accountability and the Sargent Shriver National Center on Poverty Law, and now includes more than 120 organizational and individual endorsers, and leaders in workforce and economic development across the state on its leadership team. Its mission is to work with private and public partners statewide to integrate workforce and economic development. This means thinking “outside the box” about ways to deliver job skills training and education in a way that is beneficial for workers, business and the community.

Why do we need this campaign?

Illinois must act. Over the last fifteen years Illinois has experienced an economic shift that commands both public and private sector attention and action. Despite having the nation’s fifth largest state economy, the State ranks 35th in the growth of the Gross State Product, producing only 37,000 jobs per year. Between 1990 and 2005, the number of manufacturing jobs in Illinois declined by nearly 25 percent. During this same period, job growth occurred in education, health services, and hospitality, industries paying significantly less than manufacturing, and often requiring post-secondary education and training. But, in Illinois over one million eighteen to sixty-four year olds have no high school diploma or equivalent, and over sixty percent of these working age individuals are without an associate degree or higher.¹ Currently, just 35 percent of Illinois’ young adults are enrolled in education and training beyond high school.²

What are IWF’s goals?

Over the next three to five years, campaign partners expect to generate both the viable solutions and political will necessary to make the integration of workforce and economic development a state priority.

What does it mean to endorse IWF?

Campaign endorsers believe, to compete successfully in a global economy and end poverty, Illinois needs an integrated economic and workforce development policy that *works for everyone*: producing skilled workers, in strong businesses, with good jobs, that foster thriving communities. Realizing this vision will require a series of policy initiatives that:

- Ensure Illinoisans develop the skills businesses demand in a modern economy.
- Create career paths and job opportunities for all working-age Illinoisans, from the least skilled and most disadvantaged to middle income workers whose skills have become obsolete.
- Invest resources in the capital and human infrastructure needed to attract and retain “high road” employers that provide quality jobs, wages, and benefits.
- Encourage entrepreneurship, small business growth, technology transfers from Illinois’ higher education system, and other economic/workforce development innovation in all communities across Illinois to grow competitive state businesses.
- Support economic and workforce development that is environmentally, socially, and economically sustainable.

How can I become involved?

The first step is to become an endorser, either as an organization or as an individual. Joining the campaign in this way will allow us to communicate with you about opportunities for involvement in the campaign as they arise. In 2009, we anticipate sponsoring a series of hearings around the state to gather input on workforce development needs and community generated solutions.
